CREATION OF THE COMMISSION:

- Created in 2012 by the NC General Assembly as a *temporary* commission housed with the NC
 Department of Justice
- Reformed in 2013 as a *permanent* commission with specified appointments
- Operated without funding until 2017 when a position was hired through grant funding
- Relocated to the NC Administrative Office of the Courts in 2018
- Appropriated \$250k recurring operating funds in Nov. 2021



North Carolina Human Trafficking Commission

STATUTORY CHARGES

- 1. To receive funding on behalf of the State to examine and combat human trafficking;
- 2. To commission, fund, and facilitate quantitative and qualitative research and to create measurement, assessment, and accountability mechanisms;
- 3. To **inform and educate** law enforcement personnel, social services providers, and the general public;
- To suggest and provide assistance and review with new policies, procedures, or legislation;
- 5. To develop regional response teams; and
- 6. To identify gaps in law enforcement or service provision and recommend solutions.

North Carolina Housing and Finance Agency

2025 Supportive Housing Safe (SH-Safe) Program

- Funding for 501(c)3 nonprofit organizations the acquisition, rehabilitation, and/or new construction of developments serving victims and survivors of human trafficking
- Applicants must currently serve survivors/victims of human trafficking, domestic violence, or sexual assault. SH-Safe eligible properties must serve adults or children that are victims/survivors of human trafficking.

Non-Profit Tiers

The Tier Ratings in this directory refer to an organization's self-identified specification on human trafficking from the Polaris Project. The tiers do not refer to quality or preference but only to the organization's focus on trafficking. Tiers 1 through 4 indicate the following level of specification:

Tier 1: The organization's primary focus and/or mission is human trafficking.

Tier 2: Human trafficking is **part** of the organization's focus, but they also focus on other populations, and they have a specific human trafficking project or staff person dedicated to human trafficking.


Tier 3: The organization's focus and mission are **not focused specifically** on human trafficking, but their mission is focused on other high-risk populations or victim services, and has no specific human trafficking project or dedicated staff.

Tier 4: The organization is a **general social services organization** that is part of the anti-human trafficking effort by accepting referrals, attending training, etc.



Standard 10: Media and Publicity The organization practices and encourages responsible media coverage and publicity on human trafficking.		
Exceeds Standard	The organization includes information about responsible reporting in replies to media inquiries, provides media with original or credited photos or illustrations that do not stereotype or misrepresent the issue of trafficking, educates reporters about responsible reporting and tips for interviewing survivors, and acts proactively to prepare media response when major events happen. The organization provides access to media training for those who participate in interviews or presentations.	
Meets Standard	The organization's website includes basic, factual information about trafficking, as well as links to related resources, for the purpose of informing responsible reporting. victims / survivors are not included or depicted in media contacts without informed consent and support. The organization has protocols for responding to media inquiries.	
Does Not Meet Standard	The organization shares inaccurate, stereotypical, or sensationalized information or images with the media; does not refer the media to anti-trafficking organizations that are better able to respond; and / or involves victims / survivors without consent, preparation, or support. The organization exerts influence to encourage victims / survivors to share their stories, be present for events, or represent the interests of the organization to the public or supporters. The organization does not have protocols to provide support for victims / survivors who do share their stories.



- Anyone can be a victim of human trafficking from infant to elderly individuals, citizens and non-citizens of the United States
- North Carolina is consistently ranked within the top ten states by the National Human Trafficking Hotline
- Human Trafficking occurs all over the state in both rural and populated cities
- Anyone under the age of 18 that is performing a commercial sex act is a victim of sex trafficking
- Most traffickers use various means such as tricking, defrauding, manipulating or threatening victims
- Human Trafficking does NOT require transportation to occur
- The trafficker is most often someone the victim knows: family member, significant other, employer, daycare attendant, a friend met online...

Human Trafficking Commission Grants

The North Carolina Human Trafficking Commission (HTC) was designated under **SB 105 in the 2021-2023 biennium budget** to award and administer funds to organizations within the state that serve victims and survivors of human trafficking. The HTC activated an Appropriation Committee for the purposes of overseeing the grant program development and process. View the original text from **pages 356-363 of the State Budget**.
